We are all looking for something. We all want to be happy. For children, happiness may simply be the experience of having their needs satisfied, being made to feel good, safe, secure. As we grow older, these needs become more complex. We need to succeed, to be recognised, to occupy our own place in the world. Every person lives this process of development, each in his or her own unique way. Of course, we are limited by the particular circumstances in which we find ourselves. For some, the limitations take the form of poverty, or health, or education, or the constantly changing face of world history. Nevertheless, we all want to be happy and to make the most of the hand we have been dealt.

Today our scripture readings help us to explore these deep human longings in the light of God's word and God's plan for us. If we know the story of Job, maybe we can recognise his changing fortunes as typical of the human condition. For reasons he doesn't know or understand, his life has become unbearable. Who is to blame? As far as he knows, he has been faithful to all the demands of the Law, so he refuses to accept that his troubles are a punishment from God. But he also knows the goodness of God and so he refuses to blame God for all that has gone wrong in his life. In the end, he simply has to surrender and entrust himself to God's loving mercy. On the other hand, St Paul is able to view the world in the light of the Good News of Jesus Christ. He sees that this is the final answer to everyone's quest for happiness, starting with himself, and so he commits himself to sharing this Gospel with everyone, whatever it might cost him.

In today's Gospel we find Jesus responding with love and compassion to those he meets. They know that Jesus can help them, whatever their need might be. They come to him from all around the town bringing people who are sick and those possessed by demons, and Jesus cures them all. But in his night-time prayer, Jesus realises that his mission goes beyond this little seaside town. "Everybody is looking for you," he is told by the disciples and Jesus knows the truth that "everybody" is more than this local population – it is the whole of humanity, for all time. He has to move on. His mission for the salvation of the world is just beginning. Although

“everybody” is looking for an immediate resolution to their problems, this is symptomatic of their deep, inner longing for happiness, and ours.

The issue for us is just the same as ever. Like Job, we puzzle over the difficulties of life. Why do we suffer, especially when we try to do what we believe we should be doing? Why do some people seem to have an easier life than others? Is there really a God? If so, does God not care about what is happening to us? As Christians, we believe that Jesus Christ is God’s answer to all our questions. St John reassures us that “God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life.” And so, like the people of the time of Jesus, we are among all those who are “looking for him”. We need to hear his voice. We need to know that he is close to us. We need to feel the power of his healing touch. And it is here that we find the one who, risen from the dead, reassures us, “Don’t be afraid. I have overcome the world. Know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time.”

Now, like Paul, we have been commissioned to go out and share the Good News of our faith: Jesus Christ is risen from the dead and he lives in the hearts of all those who believe in him. He enables us to live in the hope of eternal life, where suffering and death, pain and sorrow will be no more. But this is not a “pie in the sky”, “happy ever after” ending; it is rather a challenge to get on with building God’s kingdom here and now. Together, strengthened through prayer and the celebration of the sacraments, we will discover the happiness for which we are all searching.
