"Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted."

Tony carried the weight of the world on his shoulders and in his heavily laden briefcase as he strode towards work. In fact, he was five years old, travelling alongside his older brother while his mother pushed the baby in the pram. The bright red polyester briefcase - which Tony carried with such determination - held a pencil, a toy car and a clean handkerchief. His mother, Trish, baby sister, Bethany (four months), and elder brother, Paul (aged seven), ignored Tony's latest attempt to appear "important" and, instead, saw a little boy playing a game on his way to school. Trish was a Very Important Person. As she watched Tony and Paul join their friends, Trish didn't see herself as extraordinary. Yet all day and every day, she was wife, mother, nurse, teacher, chef, artist, manager, counsellor, financier, planner and a million other things besides. The parents at the school gate didn't boast of their celebrity status and yet, to their children, they were amazing. There's a big difference between people who think they are important and those who really are important. Real heroes and heroines don't boast, and when asked to speak about their remarkable achievements are surprised and say something like, "I was only doing my job. Anybody else would have done the same." During the pandemic lockdown, people shopped for neighbours, offered friendship to those who were lonely and helped people whom Covid forced into self-isolation. Staff isolated themselves with the vulnerable residents of the care homes where they worked. Volunteers supplied food for busy hospital staff who couldn't relax in hospital canteens. We can all think of fantastic examples of amazing people. In today's Gospel, Jesus saw people who pushed themselves to the top of the social ladder because of a full wallet, a big house or a job that put them above others in their workplace. Self-proclaimed celebrities invited Jesus for a meal because his presence could boost their public image. They liked to hear him speak, but they also watched his every mouthful of food and drink, commenting on it afterwards. Jesus was aware of the shallow pretence of people whose real interest was in selfpromotion and their bank balance. He came as a doctor for those who were sick

and so he accepted the invitations and polite conversation of social climbers, hoping that his presence might make a difference.

Yet Jesus also watched some guests at the banquets to which he was invited climb the social ladder by clambering over others whom they considered less important, less worthy of attention. Did they argue with those whom they downgraded or were the latter too embarrassed to make a fuss? Did the self-seekers want to boost their own importance by sitting as close as possible to their host? How did the host react to seeing his guests fighting for the best places — which were, of course, next to him? How often did the householder welcome Jesus into his home and take the lowest place, putting Jesus at the head of the table? Was Jesus sometimes an afterthought, left to fend for himself, perhaps personally experiencing the humiliation of being forced to sit in the lowest place, receiving the scraps and leftovers?

Reaching the school gates transformed Tony from a big and important businessman into a little boy. He didn't mind because he'd enjoyed his game of "make believe". Trish was also happy because, although not a global celebrity, she loved her children and wouldn't have changed her position for the world. What matters in life are the heart treasures, independent of fame, wealth and fortune, which might be hidden from the world at large and seen only through the eyes of love. The poet Shelley wrote of the shattered colossal statue of Ozymandias, "King of Kings", who had thought himself great but, eventually, was nothing more than rubble in a windswept desert. The world had forgotten the great works and actions of Ozymandias and saw only "the decay of that colossal Wreck, boundless and bare". As the saying goes, "Self-praise needs no recommendation." The great king fell from the pedestal on which he had placed himself.

We are surrounded by VIPs who are unlikely to hit the headlines – but would you prefer to be Trish or Ozymandias? Who is the most amazing person in your life? Why is that person so special? Why has that person made such a difference to your life and helped to give it meaning?
