This time last year, the United Nations annual conference on Climate Change – COP 26 – had just concluded in Glasgow. While world leaders met inside the summit, climate campaigners – many of them Christian – campaigned for climate action outside. Near the front gates, a banner of Christian Climate Action read “Stop Climate Chaos Deaths” and below it was a line-up representing seven dead bodies covered with white sheets labelled “War”, “Famine”, “Pollution”, “Skin Cancer”, “Drought”, “Suicide”, “Floods”. The drama highlighted that the climate crisis and associated issues were already having a profound impact on communities and ecosystems around the world.

However, the same group also organised a “Coat of Hopes” which travelled with campaigners walking to the conference from London. The patchwork garment appeared at a Global Day of Action in Glasgow and conference delegates were invited to wear the coat to feel the weight of responsibility of the hopes, fears and prayers of ordinary people across the UK and the world for the environment and for vulnerable communities. Sewn onto the coat were more than three hundred patches produced by local church groups. The patches showed grief for loss of species, remembrances of landscapes, prayers that hearts could expand to welcome refugees displaced by climate breakdown, and also positive dreams of carefree joy in nature and living in peace. The Coat of Hopes displayed bees on flowers, birds feeding their young, and phrases like “Protect our home”, “Waste is a design fault” and “Save our children's future”.

Today's reading from Isaiah is full of joy. This third Sunday of Advent is called “Gaudete” Sunday and that is why we light the pink candle. “Gaudete” means “rejoice”. The prophet inspires thoughts of a world of hope, a world of God's sure and strong promise to lift those who are bowed down. All creation will be fruitful, reflecting God's love. In the Gospel we sense a feeling of anticipation growing among the people. This is picked up in the Psalm and the second reading, which emphasise God's faithfulness to us. It is difficult during the trials of our lives to continually praise God in all the circumstances we experience. But that is what faith

is and we must be patient. Faith is bigger than our today and filled with the promise of tomorrow.

In the Gospel reading we hear that John the Baptist is so important because he urges people to turn from sin and towards God to experience God's mercy. Such challenges are crucial for any reform or authentic transformation of people or groups. That is why we focus on John the Baptist every Advent. However, Jesus' teaching goes way beyond John the Baptist. Christmas always renews our commitment to bring God's revolutionary love into a world that so desperately needs it. It is the Lord who brings love and healing into our lives.

We are prompted to consider: what kind of changes do we seek in Advent? Advent is a time to prepare not only materially but also spiritually for the coming of the Lord. It is a time to step outside our busy lives, our tasks and appointments, and simply recognise God's loving presence in all humanity and in the natural world. Take some time today to look up into the sky and be aware of breathing, taking in the fresh God-given air that keeps us alive. And can we be of service to people who are sick or in trouble or worried about facing Christmas on a low income? Can we give time to people who might be depressed or who do not have many friends? As Christmas draws near, let us glorify God for sending Christ to walk alongside us on this earth.

On Gaudete Sunday, we are reminded to rejoice in the living of our ordinary lives – to remember God's gifts to us in family and friends, in work and in play and in the natural world – to remember God loves us more than we could ever understand. We can have hope in our hearts and trust in God that we are able to do this in good and bad times. Does this mean we should go about our daily lives with a constant smile on our faces? Well, we could smile more often than we do. We could be more willing to focus on our blessings rather than our problems. As Advent progresses and Christmas draws near, let us pray for a heightened awareness of God's presence among us and openness to being changed and blessed by it.
