In Nathaniel Hawthorne's tale The Birth-Mark, the brilliant sci	ientist Aylmer falls in
love with a beautiful young woman called Georgiana. She is	s beautiful but has a
birthmark like a small hand on her cheek. It is attuned to her	emotions, becoming
almost invisible when she blushes, but standing out when she	is pale. Other lovers
have thought this a sign of beauty, telling her that a mag	ical fairy must have
touched her cheek, but Aylmer sees it as a blemish, an imperfe	ection that challenges
his scientific skills. He becomes unable to appreciate his wife	e's beauty clearly as
he becomes obsessed with what he sees as her imperfection	n. He urges her to let
him remove the mark.	

Georgiana realises that Aylmer is disturbed by her blemish. He cannot see beyond the blemish to the beauty that is within her. She is deeply hurt but, out of love for him, agrees to submit to whatever experiment he devises to render her beautiful again in his eyes. She drinks a chemical potion destined to remove the birthmark but finds that the mark is linked to her life. As the mark disappears, her life drains from her. Aylmer has achieved his idealistic dream of a perfect wife, but in the process he has destroyed what he failed to love and accept.

The Gospel for today, from Matthew, may seem as harsh and burdensome as the urge to have the perfect image of oneself or another. How can sinful people like ourselves measure up to the exacting standard of perfection that Jesus seems to put before us? Is there any point in even trying to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect? How could we ever hope to reach such a state of perfection in this life and not be destroyed in the attempt?

Luke's Gospel echoes the same teaching but makes a crucial change in the wording. We are told by Jesus to be *compassionate* as our heavenly Father is compassionate. That in itself is a tall enough order, but it avoids the tyranny of that word "perfection". Yet here Matthew faces us, without escape, with the challenge of Jesus. There must be a key to this, as Jesus does not place impossible burdens on our shoulders nor make demands that will lead to inevitable failure. The key lies in the promise of God's grace and in the very fact of the incarnation. God does not demand the impossible of us. Instead, we are offered a share in God's own life – a

His becoming human transforms our human nature from within, making it possible for us to be holy because Jesus himself is our holiness and our healing. When we make space for him in our lives and try our best to follow his teaching, his grace comes alive within us.

Christian life is never about trying to achieve some impossible state of perfection. It is always about intimacy with God. This means allowing God to become a familiar part of our lives. Most of us are only too conscious of our own sins and imperfections, and even more conscious of those of others. Being harsh and judgemental with ourselves or with others is never the answer, and when we hear that note in our own voice or that of others, we know it is not from God.

God's compassion is infinite, as is God's grace, which comes to us new every morning. Every day is a day for a new start, and no one is more willing to help us than God. Whatever temptations and difficulties we face, whatever defects of character we may think we have, God looks on us and finds us very good. God has faith in us, loves us and has hopes for us. It is that faith, hope and love that give us the strength we need to face each day with its challenges, knowing that God's grace is perfection enough for each one of us from our birth to our dying day. Addicts in recovery often encourage themselves with sayings such as "one day at a time". If we can take up this attitude and spend a little time with God each day, reviewing the choices we have made and seeing where we have been present to or absent from God's loving presence in our lives, we will begin to see where the path to goodness lies for us, and will find the grace to respond.
