"I have made your name known."

In 1961, US President John F. Kennedy pledged that America would put a man on the moon before the decade was out. Though he did not live to see that day, his pledge was fulfilled with the Apollo 11 space mission in 1969. A three-man crew travelled 240,000 miles across space, touching down on the lunar surface seventy-six hours later. Taking their first, very tentative, steps, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin laid a plaque which said: "Here men from the planet Earth first set foot upon the Moon. We came in peace." What was so incredible about the moon landing was not just the technological advances that made it possible, but that an estimated 600 million people were watching it worldwide. Without a television camera mounted on the side of the spacecraft, the moon landing would still have been a great American achievement. Television, however, transformed it into something of global significance, a unifying moment for the whole of humankind.

The potential of the media to be a power for good was something the Second Vatican Council had begun to recognise. Newspapers, films, radio and television could be used to bring people together and promote Gospel values. In a new spirit of engagement with the outside world, the Council inaugurated World Communications Day in 1967 as a way of continuing the mission of Jesus to make God known.

Apollo 11 did not discover the moon. People could see the moon for themselves in the night sky. It was just that no one had ever been there. In the same way, people in Jesus' day worshipped God; they understood God's commandments; they could see God's splendour in creation – but they had never experienced God in the way that Jesus did. His mission was to enable everyone to know God as Father. For "knowing" God in the Hebrew sense of the word means more than acquaintance. It conveys the idea of intimate relationship.

Jesus was a natural broadcaster. Hillsides were his auditorium. He also taught in the Temple at festival times when Jerusalem was most crowded. He preached in a cove near Capernaum where, from Peter's boat, the surface of the water could amplify his voice. He used parables to convey profound truths. He touched lepers and shared meals with outcasts so that people could grasp the limitlessness of divine compassion. He revealed the truth about God to as many people as he could, in as many ways as he could. In doing so, Jesus stretched people's understanding of "glory" beyond the sense of majesty. He offered a glimpse of the graciousness of our heavenly Father in wanting to be a part of our lives and in wanting us to be a part of his. To "know" God is to become caught up in glory. In today's Gospel, we listened to the deepest prayer of Jesus' heart, that we, his followers, might share the life of our gracious Father God and so begin our journey to eternity.

It is no accident that World Communications Day comes on the Sunday before Pentecost. Our first reading tells us that Mary and the apostles prayed constantly in the upper room, and St Peter in our second reading describes how the Spirit of glory thereafter "rested" upon them. They did not just preach and publish Gospels – through them, other people encountered God for themselves. And that same Spirit of glory rests upon you and me. We, too, have been gifted to communicate something of the truth and beauty of God.

World Communications Day gives us an opportunity to reflect upon what kind of message we are giving. The Internet has provided a more effective means of communicating than was available to previous generations, and it is our responsibility to ensure that what we are communicating is glorifying. Social media is more than a platform for self-expression. Just as important is our receptiveness to what other people might be trying to tell us, for communication is a two-way process. It is a relationship. As St Francis said in his famous prayer, "Grant that I may not so much seek to be understood as to understand." "Preach the Gospel at all times," he also said, "and, if necessary, use words." For the truth of God is best told as Jesus told it, by reaching out in love. We are men and women who come in peace, just as those first lunar explorers did. And we too step very respectfully into other people's worlds.
