"But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better cast into the sea."

Nelson's Column is one of the landmarks of London. The 18-tonne statue of the admiral is more than five metres tall and stands on top of a 56-metre granite column in Trafalgar Square. It is taller than the column of Trajan in Rome, but, to the chagrin of some, shorter than Napoleon's column in Paris! Something of the history of warfare is in that statue. Nelson has lost his right arm to cannon shot. His ship's surgeon had to amputate his arm to save his life. The other wound is not obvious as we look up at the statue: he has lost the sight of one eye but not the eye itself. This happened at the first of his great victories, the Battle of the Nile in 1798. Nelson was fortunate to survive amputation. Many did not because of shock or subsequent infection. Surgery advanced in the coming centuries, but so, tragically, did the development of weapons used in the conduct of war. Amputations continue to this day. There are those who refuse to be defeated by such life-changing injuries. The Invictus Games serve as an example. First held in 2014, these international events involve injured servicemen and women. The word "Invictus" means "unconquered", chosen as an embodiment of the fighting spirit of those who refuse to be defeated by their wounds. To their number, we must add all who take part in the Paralympic Games.

Such are the tragic wounds of war. We are engaged in a more fundamental war: that between good and evil, between Christ and the arrogant claims of Satan. It is a war for the redemption of all humanity. Today's Gospel calls us to the sacrifices we must carry out in our lives. We are to cut out whatever holds us back from the true following of our Saviour. This is painful, but necessary for salvation. It demands courage. Christ uses very powerful metaphors, so serious is what he requires of us. He also speaks of hell. This is not "Sheol", the place of the dead, to which he descended after his death. It is "Gehenna" which, in Our Lord's Jewish culture, was the destiny of those who completely reject God and his mercy. Christ speaks also of the damage that can be done to the faith of the "little ones" – be they children or adults – who are especially dear to him. As a mother has love for the weakest of her children, so does Our Lord for these who are the least in his Church; he does so with all the fulness and

tenderness of his divine love. He also speaks with the righteous anger that comes with that love. Our Saviour knows the effect of scandal on the most innocent and vulnerable of believers. He uses the images of the grimmest punishments for what is done to those who have his protective love. In contrast, those who show the humblest act of kindness to the little ones are blessed by Christ. This Sunday's Gospel passage begins with a call to tolerance as opposed to the apostle John's angry claim to ownership of the power of the name of Jesus.

There are several messages in today's readings, and they all call upon the authenticity of our bond with Christ. He asks us to cut out of our lives any sin that may hold us back from true service of his kingdom. This demands courage: it is painful but necessary for true discipleship. His words are stern, but even more stern is his righteous anger against those who damage or undermine the faith of the "little ones" who are dear to him. Unrepented scandal deserves the fate of the damned. Christ takes sin seriously, so seriously that he is on his way to Jerusalem to suffer and die for our redemption. We cannot be passive or casual about the insidious power that sin can have over us, and its effect on those to whom we are called to show a special protective love. The Letter of St James calls us to the same hunger and thirst for justice. The fire of the Holy Spirit is to be in our minds and hearts, and not some insipid faith that demands so little of us. We heed the cry of Moses: "If only the whole people of the Lord were prophets, and the Lord gave his Spirit to them all!" Each day we pray for the same Holy Spirit, not the spirit or timidity and fear but of all that makes of us a prophetic people, speaking and acting as servants, not self-appointed owners of God's kingdom. There is no place for such elitism among the Catholic people. The "little ones" teach us otherwise.
