"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor."

This wasn't the first time that Jesus had spoken in the synagogue in Nazareth. He had regularly taken his turn to address the congregation since he was twelve years old and officially came of age as a Jewish man. The townsfolk were probably used to hearing what he had to say. Of course, we have no idea how he explained the Law and the prophets before he started his public ministry. We can only guess that, on this occasion, the people of Nazareth might have wondered if he had anything fresh to add to all they had heard previously. They might have been intrigued to see how somebody they knew so well had suddenly become famous throughout Galilee. Some would have been very proud of Jesus, whereas others might have been sceptical that he could teach them any more than could the local rabbi. Jesus recognised this and might have felt a bit nervous about speaking to people he had known all his life - but he still took the risk of speaking up. Everybody knew that he was a carpenter who had done no further studies than he had acquired alongside every other boy in Nazareth – and yet, local gossip credited Jesus with a very different outlook on life and people wanted to satisfy their curiosity. When Jesus stood up in the synagogue, everybody was intrigued to hear more.

Jesus took the scroll of the prophet Isaiah and read that he had been sent to give good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives, to give dignity to those who were oppressed and to give sight to people who could not see. Everybody in the synagogue was familiar with this text and had probably heard it more times than they could count. Isaiah had lived long before they did and was speaking about the Messiah who was to come. What made the congregation sit up and take notice was that Jesus declared that the prophecy had been fulfilled and that they no longer had to wait for its fruition. People quickly wondered if his words were blasphemous because it seemed that Jesus was implying that he was the one whom God had sent to save his people. We can only imagine how anxious and scared Mary felt on listening to her son's message. She knew that blasphemy was punishable by death and that nothing she could say would calm the anger of the townsfolk if they decided that Jesus really was claiming to be the Messiah. Yet Mary also knew that Jesus was

saying something that people needed to hear. Instead, they saw the speaker and did not listen to the message of hope that he communicated. They did not stop to think that Jesus really did hold the answer to their longings.

Jesus would later say that a prophet held no credibility within his own town and amongst his own people. He saw for himself that they had missed the point and did not recognise the privilege of being amongst the very first to hear the message of freedom and of hope that Jesus bought them.

As we celebrate the Jubilee of the World of Communications, we know that our means of communicating have changed beyond anybody's imagining during the past few decades. Technology has caused massive changes in everybody's lives – possibly far more than we realise.

Somebody once said that there are two people who speak the truth: the brave and the crazy. It takes courage to speak out and to be the voice which others need to hear. Not only that, but we are also called to be listeners, because occasionally the most unlikely people unintentionally challenge us to rethink our priorities in life. How often do we give these individuals an opportunity to be heard? How often do we pass over them, perhaps thinking that they have nothing worth saying?

If we had been in the synagogue in Nazareth the day that Jesus stood up to speak about his mission, how would we have reacted? Would we have listened thoughtfully or would we have rejected him because we thought that we knew more than he did? Would we have been brave enough to insist that Jesus be given more time to explain what it was he was trying to say?
