Second Sunday of Easter (Divine Mercy)

"Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe."

Perhaps you've met people who are disappointed or angry with God, who say that they've stopped believing in God. They might say something like, "I prayed that my mum would get well, but she died. So, what's the point?"

It's hard to hear that, but it's so important to remember that we can't argue people into believing. Gentle listening and sharing about the joy and peace that our own faith brings us is probably a better way. When Thomas has trouble believing, Jesus shows him his wounds and gently encourages him, "doubt no longer but believe". People who are hurting need a listening ear and the reassurance that Jesus can transform their suffering and wounds and bring meaning into what seems senseless. We too need not be surprised when doubts arise within us. Thomas Merton says "Faith is not the suppression of doubt. It is the overcoming of doubt, and you overcome doubt by going through it. The person of faith who has never experienced doubt is not truly a person of faith." Somehow or other, we need the doubts in order to trust and then make the leap of faith!

In many ways, we are the people that Jesus is referring to when he says "Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe." Obviously, we do not see the Risen Lord in the same way that Thomas and the other disciples experienced him. We rely on other experiences, like prayer, the sacraments, scripture, the testimony of other people, and the long, long traditions of the Church. In fact, our Gospel passage tells us that the signs of Jesus "are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name. Hearing the Word of God and opening our hearts to its message leads us to faith in Jesus who promises us life in its fulness.

People with honest doubts – ourselves included – are not doing anything wrong. We don't have to have absolute certainty about our faith, although those times when we do feel deep confirmation in our faith are times of grace and are real gifts from God. In today's Gospel we see the movement of grace in Thomas, who moved from stubborn doubt to a deep, tender, and wholehearted belief. In fact, Thomas' profession of faith is among the clearest expressions of the divinity of Jesus Christ in all the Gospels. "My Lord and my God!" is the culmination of Thomas' journey from

the pain of disillusionment, disappointment and bereavement to the serenity of faith and trust.

In our times of doubt, what we most need is someone who will walk with us in our doubts and suffering, a companion who represents the Risen Lord who walked with the crestfallen disciples on the road to Emmaus. Our faith is a relationship, not a formula, or an ideology, or a set of propositions which can be proved beyond doubt. Pope Benedict tells us that "being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Our faith, then, is a relationship with Jesus Christ who came to share our human reality, who healed people and preached the Good News to the poor, who lived a life of love, generosity and joy, who died for our sakes and now is risen.

In Christ's risen body, the wounds of the passion were still to be seen, and today wherever there is woundedness, Christ is present. He invites us to do the same, to witness to the power of faith in him by touching the wounds of the body of Christ in the here and now. We can trust that when, in a spirit of faith, we touch our own wounds and the wounds of other suffering people, the Spirit of the Risen Lord will transform all suffering, giving it meaning and hope.
