"A Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where he was, and when he saw him, he had compassion."

In 2018, marine archaeologists announced that, in the Black Sea, they had found an intact sunken Greek merchant ship dating from approximately 400 BC. The world's oldest-known intact shipwreck lies on its side, 1.5 miles deep and far beyond the reach of modern divers. Its cargo of wine, olive oil and other trading goods is untouched and undamaged. Experts think that the ship sank in bad weather, perhaps swamped by a massive freak wave. Even today, despite advanced on-board technology, such an unpredictable monster wave can swamp and sink a vessel, giving the crew no time to respond to the danger. Perhaps, when the wave struck, it simply sank like a stone. Perhaps this also explains why the ancient shipwreck appears undamaged. In 2004, an extreme wave struck Alderney, in the Channel Islands, with such force and pressure that it would have destroyed almost any merchant vessel sailing the high seas today. The Greek wooden trading ship and its crew didn't stand a chance.

Coincidentally, today's Gospel story of the Good Samaritan reminds us of the Good Samaritans who serve through the Coast Guard, lifeboat crews, helicopter rescue service and first responders who sometimes risk their own lives to save others.

Jesus was a fantastic storyteller. It's why even non-Christians and atheists will quite happily describe someone as "a Good Samaritan", knowing the meaning of the expression even if they don't know the story. In Jesus' day, any traveller risked meeting bandits. Traditionally, we associate highwaymen threatening their potential victims with the words "your money or your life". Did this happen to the traveller in Jesus' story or did the bandits just attack him anyway? Perhaps he put up a fight to defend himself and his property rather than just handing it over: we don't know and Jesus doesn't tell us. What he does say is that two people who should have been prepared to help the injured man ignored him. Perhaps they had good excuses for hurrying on towards Jerusalem. We don't know. Jesus, however, draws attention to a Samaritan, someone who was despised in Israel but who didn't think twice about responding to someone in need even if his support cost him time and money. Those who listened to Jesus were unimpressed: the priest and the Levite deserved greater

respect then Jesus gave them. Instead, he showed them someone to whom public opinion and social status meant nothing when somebody needed help. Did the injured man call out the equivalent of an SOS? We don't know. The Good Samaritan was the first responder and that was all that mattered. He'd saved a life and continued his journey without looking for thanks.

We take it for granted that any ship in distress will send an SOS or a Mayday signal and that other vessels and the emergency services, hearing the cry for help, will respond. We remember 25-year-old Jack Phillips, the *Titanic* wireless operator. Only four years after SOS became the official, internationally recognised call for help, Phillips sent urgent signals from the *Titanic*, hoping for a rescue that could save lives, knowing that his would not be one of them. His heroism on 15 April 1912 enabled 712 of the 2,208 people aboard to survive the ship's sinking. Through his persistence, the *Carpathia* and other ships travelled out of their way on their rescue mission to the *Titanic*. There were many Good Samaritans that day, most of whom are known only to God.

Seafarers still encounter risks, insecurity, loneliness, and often intense suffering and injustice. A young kitchen worker on a luxury cruise ship described earning less than £1 per hour for her illegally long shifts. Sailing in international waters, who checks on a crews` working conditions? What about the sailors who, bringing us fuel, food and other merchandise, braved the Red Sea and the possibility of being shelled during the Israel–Lebanon conflict? Then there were the naval vessels, themselves under threat, deployed to the Red Sea to protect the merchants... That's why we pray "for those in peril on the sea". May God be with them.
