Twenty Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!" Luke 17:5

Nobody knows for sure whether the bedtime stories of old have been replaced by mobile phones or the internet, but we still like stories and even need them in whatever form they come. Stories are as old as humanity: think of Adam and Eve in the garden, or Noah and the flood. In many parts of the world there's a storyteller who tells tales to entrance and entertain the listeners. It's not all that long ago in the countryside of Ireland that folk would gather around the storyteller in the evening as he sat by the turf fire and amused and delighted his listeners.

There's one story that goes like this. In the days when priests didn't have to give a sermon on the readings of the day, Fr Brendan, the parish priest of St Brigid's church - known locally as St. Bridy's - was a good man but somewhat fierce. The Gospel one Sunday was from St Luke about the Pharisee and the tax collector. "Two men went up to the Temple", began Fr Brendan, and then launched into a criticism that only a few men turned up at Mass. Fr Brendan realised there was quite a good mileage in this text, so he used it again the next week. "They went to the Temple to pray", he said, "but you sit there whispering to one another about who's got a cow for sale, or what the price of wheat is." The next week he compared the Pharisees' almsgiving to the meagre collections at St Bridy's. The following week he took the tax collector's appeal for mercy as a comment on the few numbers who went to confession. And so on, each week for a year he used this passage as a peg on which to hang his criticisms. When it was time for the same Gospel passage to be read again, Pat, sitting in the congregation, turned to Sean next to him and whispered, "It was a sad day for St Bridy's when those two fellows went up to that Temple".

What has this to do with today's readings you may well ask. I hope we shall see. At first sight, Jesus' words in today's Gospel seem to be harsh. Is he recommending that a worker who's tired out by a day's ploughing in the fields should then have to wait hand and foot on his master, who's been sitting around doing nothing all day? It seems quite out of character of the compassionate and caring Jesus. But it has a different ring if we note that Jesus begins his story by saying in effect to his disciples "Which one of you wouldn't behave like this?" Is he belittling them? Rather, we could

rather say he is warning them. He has chosen them but they still need to learn. We remember other accounts in the Gospels where the disciples are arguing among themselves about who is greatest in the kingdom. Or when Jesus shows them a little child and tells them to stop being silly. Or the time when the mother of James and John comes to Jesus asking for top-management jobs for her two boys. In today's reading, Jesus reminds them, that as servants, they are only doing what they are meant to do. In other words, they are not to become proud or puffed up. All they have and can do depends on God's kindly grace that is given them.

And this is where Fr Brendan's Pharisee and tax collector come in. The Pharisee is praying to himself, "I am not like the rest of men, especially this tax collector". He's done it all on his own, there is no humility in him. Jesus himself tells lots of stories in his parables in which he uses images of kings and stewards, wealthy men and their servants, and of course we must all know by heart the words he uses to praise the servant who does what his master asks, "Well done, good and faithful servant". But at the Last Supper, St John tells us that something has changed. Jesus says to his apostles: "No longer do I call you servants... but... friends." The parable of the two men may not have been a good day at St Bridy's, but it is for us. If we become like the tax collector and place our trust in God alone, we may hope one day to hear Jesus say to us, "Well done, good and faithful servant."
