"The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus..." Luke 18:11

Thomas was waiting to meet up with his old friends in the run up to Christmas. It had become a decades-long annual tradition as they had scattered to various cities since their time together at school. He was glad that they had kept in touch, even into their retirement years. Andrew, Michael and Jack arrived in the coffee shop within minutes of each other and it did not take long for stories to be told from the past year, peppered with laughter and the odd "remember when" from school days. Jack, however, seemed a little distant, laughing nervously and taking long, drastic detours in the conversation, much to the surprise of his pals. As the men relocated to a restaurant, Jack made his excuses and left the other three.

As they were trying and failing to choose what to eat, Michael broke the awkward silence: "Still hasn't got it sorted, has he?" Andrew let out a sigh and lamented, "We tried our best to tell him these last two years but it's obviously – literally – fallen on deaf ears." Thomas, red-faced, slammed his menu down, uttered something colourful and exclaimed, "The fool just won't accept he needs a hearing aid! All he's been doing is pretending it's not there. Jack's waiting until there's a gap in conversation to offer some random tale. I'm getting fed up with it. You might as well treat him like a budgie in a cage: put a mirror in front of him and he'll just talk away at that!"

In our Gospel today, Jesus paints a picture of stark contrast. A proud Pharisee stands tall and dismissive of his neighbours, including the tax collector, who is kneeling. One seems puffed up, the other almost shrinking. The Pharisee is presumably wishing to be elevated onto a plinth and the tax collector is perhaps hoping for the earth to swallow him up. We can deduce this from their words. The Pharisee is boastful and long-winded. The tax collector is brief, humble, to the point. The most telling detail is what we hear of the Pharisee immediately before he opens his mouth. In our translation we have him "standing by himself". Some authorities have pointed out that a more accurate way of putting it is that he addresses the prayer to himself. In other words, God is not at all involved in this conversation. The Pharisee is like a perfectly formed, self-contained loop. Even if we were to run with the translation we have been given, it is quite clear that this one is on his own. There

is no need of God. The Pharisee's only need for others is as people who will act as examples of moral imperfection who will, by comparison, make him appear more praiseworthy.

The tax collector, on the other hand, cannot even look to heaven. This very detail shows that the wretch knows God is there and, far from excluding God from the conversation, speaks from his heart. Describing himself as "a sinner", simply and without fanfare or excessive grovelling, he declares that he has not lived up to the ideals he holds.

Good people, given the chance, respond generously to situations of want. Outstretched hands cement community bonds in a reflection of God's nature. Jesus himself was sent into this world as God's gesture of love towards needy humanity. Yet facing our own neediness is not easy. It requires us to admit that we do not have it all together. When we continue to muddle on, avoiding the embarrassing task of asking for help, we run the risk of isolating ourselves from others. Moreover, we become like Jack, a self-contained unit, sticking out like a sore thumb and creating discord, not harmony with others. Jesus invites us to approach God in our need, admitting, perhaps, the humiliating truth that we are not the finished product. Jack's friends could only help him if he was willing to admit he needed it and was open to receive such help. In the same way, God wants to help us but can only do so if there is an opening for a response. Otherwise, our prayer can resemble the Pharisee's and Jack's attempts at conversation. We will only be talking at God, not inviting a response.
