*"The people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light."*

"In spite of everything, I still believe that people are really good at heart." These words, penned by fifteen-year-old Anne Frank while hiding from Nazi persecution, echo across generations as a quiet defiance against hatred. The diary of this young Jewish girl, born in the shadows of injustice, is a beacon of mercy. Her story is not only about the Holocaust, her family's escape to the Netherlands from Germany and their frightened hiding from betrayal, arrest and Hitler's concentration camps: it is about the human cost of prejudice. Her voice, silenced too soon in Bergen-Belsen, speaks for all who have suffered because of race, religion or identity. In her belief in human goodness, Anne models a mercy that refuses to be extinguished by fear. Today, as we confront the wounds of racial injustice in our own time, Anne's mercy challenges us. It is not passive. It is not forgetful. It is a mercy that sees the image of God in every person, especially those whom the world has cast aside. Anne saw beyond war, beyond betrayal, even beyond the walls that separated her from the world. Though hunted and silenced, she refused to let hatred have the final word. In her gentle handwriting, mercy bloomed, not as softness, but as strength rooted in hope.

Jesus said, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy." Anne never knew freedom, yet she practised it in the deepest sense: through compassion, insight and forgiveness. Her diary reveals a soul who, even surrounded by fear, chose to nurture empathy rather than resentment.

In today's Gospel, Jesus climbs the mountain not to escape the world, but to reimagine it. The Beatitudes are not sentimental sayings: they are a radical blueprint for justice. In a world that glorifies wealth and power, Jesus blesses the humble and the overlooked. He raises the mourners, the meek, the peacemakers: those who hunger and thirst for righteousness. These are not passive virtues. They are the heartbeat of social justice.

To hunger for righteousness is to ache for a world where no child goes hungry, where dignity is not denied by race, poverty, or status. To be merciful is to stand with the oppressed, not from pity, but from solidarity. To be a peacemaker is to disrupt systems of violence with the courage of compassion. Jesus does not say, "Blessed are the successful," but "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness"

sake." He declares this as the cost of discipleship: to speak truth when silence is safer, to act when apathy is easier. The Beatitudes are not a reward for the comfortable: they are a challenge to the Church. They call us to build the kingdom not in theory, but in practice: in policy, in protest, in presence.

In a world where judgement often shouts louder than love, Anne Frank's witness reminds us that mercy isn't passive: it's an act of holy defiance. To believe in human goodness, to forgive those who fail us, to cling to joy amidst sorrow, these are choices that reflect God's own heart.

Jesus once said, "as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me. Whatever you did for the least of these, you did for me." Racial justice begins with this vision: to see Christ in the faces of the marginalised, to listen, to repent and to act. Mercy is not a substitute for justice, it is its soul. Jesus' Beatitudes are not a recipe for happiness, but for joy, which is so much deeper and can exist even in the darkest, most traumatic surroundings. St Maximilian Kolbe was probably not happy as he starved to death in Auschwitz, but he was certainly joy-filled and close to the God who meant everything to him.

Let us be people who, like Anne Frank, believe in goodness even when it is hard to see. Let us be people who, like Christ, extend mercy that heals and transforms. For in doing so, we proclaim a Gospel that breaks chains and builds beloved community. Let us live the Beatitudes not as poetry, but as prophecy. For in doing so, we become the salt of the earth, the light of the world – and the hands of Christ in a world still aching for justice.
