"First be reconciled to your brother and then come and offer your gift."

Wherever we are in life there are rules to be followed. In the classroom we are taught early to raise our hand to answer questions, not to run with scissors, not to pick on other children.

As we grow, we do not escape the rules. In workplaces there is often a "code of conduct" to be followed and expectations about what we will or will not do in order to remain employed.

There are also the laws and customs of the country where we live, which we all must follow or face potentially serious repercussions.

In today's readings, we are reminded of the importance of keeping God's commandments. This can potentially be viewed as another set of rules, but rules that should be a guiding light throughout our lives, helping us to discern what is right and good. Each of us has the freedom to choose whether we will follow this path. So each of us faces a choice every day. Do we choose fire or water, life or death, as it says in the first reading? Do we break the rules or keep them? This makes it sound like the decision is always easy, when in real life we know there are shades of grey. So perhaps it is worth considering why we have rules in the first place.

Rules generally have two purposes, to keep us safe and to ensure the safety and well-being of the other people around us. Our rule-breaking rarely has repercussions only for ourselves. Others can and do get hurt. The same can sometimes be true for our zealous rule-keeping.

Jesus reminds the disciples that he has not come to do away with the Law and the commandments from the Old Testament. But he does encourage us to think about them again.

It is not enough to do the bare minimum – it is not enough not to murder. Jesus says here that even anger, or the mere thought of wrongdoing, is enough to set us on the wrong path. God, who knows and sees all that we do and think, is concerned not just with our actions, but also with what is in our heart.

We are called to be more righteous even than the scribes and the Pharisees. Jesus often held up the scribes and the Pharisees as people who followed the letter of the Law without really understanding the spirit of it. For example, in the parable of the

Good Samaritan, they were more concerned about preserving their ritual cleanliness than helping the stranger in need. We all know people who are convinced of their own rightness. Perhaps sometimes even we fall into this trap, but it can lead us into a blind spot about how we are hurting or failing others. As the second reading says, the wisdom of our leaders is not the same as the wisdom of God.

Jesus calls us today, then, to be reconciled to our brother or sister before we make our offering to God. We need to look at the world around us, at our relationships with others and consider where we need to ask forgiveness.

Are there people in our life whom we have hurt, whether intentionally or unintentionally through our actions or our words? Do we care for the world around us, God's beautiful gift of creation? Do we love our neighbour as ourselves? Are our actions and our thoughts aligned? Does our confidence in our own righteousness lead us to overlook the needs of others? Are the choices we make really the right ones according to God rather than the worldly authorities? Do we care more about what others think of us than what we know to be right? Are our hearts turned toward God and away from what we know to be wrong? These are all questions for us to consider as we go about our daily lives. God has given us the freedom to make all these choices, but God does not leave us to make them alone. God is with us through it all, watching us, loving us, sending the Spirit to help and guide us.

Through God's grace, we pray for the courage to seek forgiveness and reconciliation with all our sisters and brothers. We seek the strength to make the right choices and to do all that God asks of us. We come before the Lord, reconciling with one another, offering our lives to his service.
